In Washington on the House Appropriations Committee, every Community Project Funding request I submitted for our district advanced this year, meaning more than \$45 million for 17 local projects cleared their first major hurdle.

Back home in the Sixth, I presented a long overdue Purple Heart to a Hoosier veteran's family, welcomed the Smithsonian to Rushville, and sat down with community leaders across the district. It was also a special month for one Wayne County student, whose artwork now hangs in the U.S. Capitol.

It's an honor to continue representing the Hoosiers of Indiana's Sixth District. Here's a look at my recent work for our district.

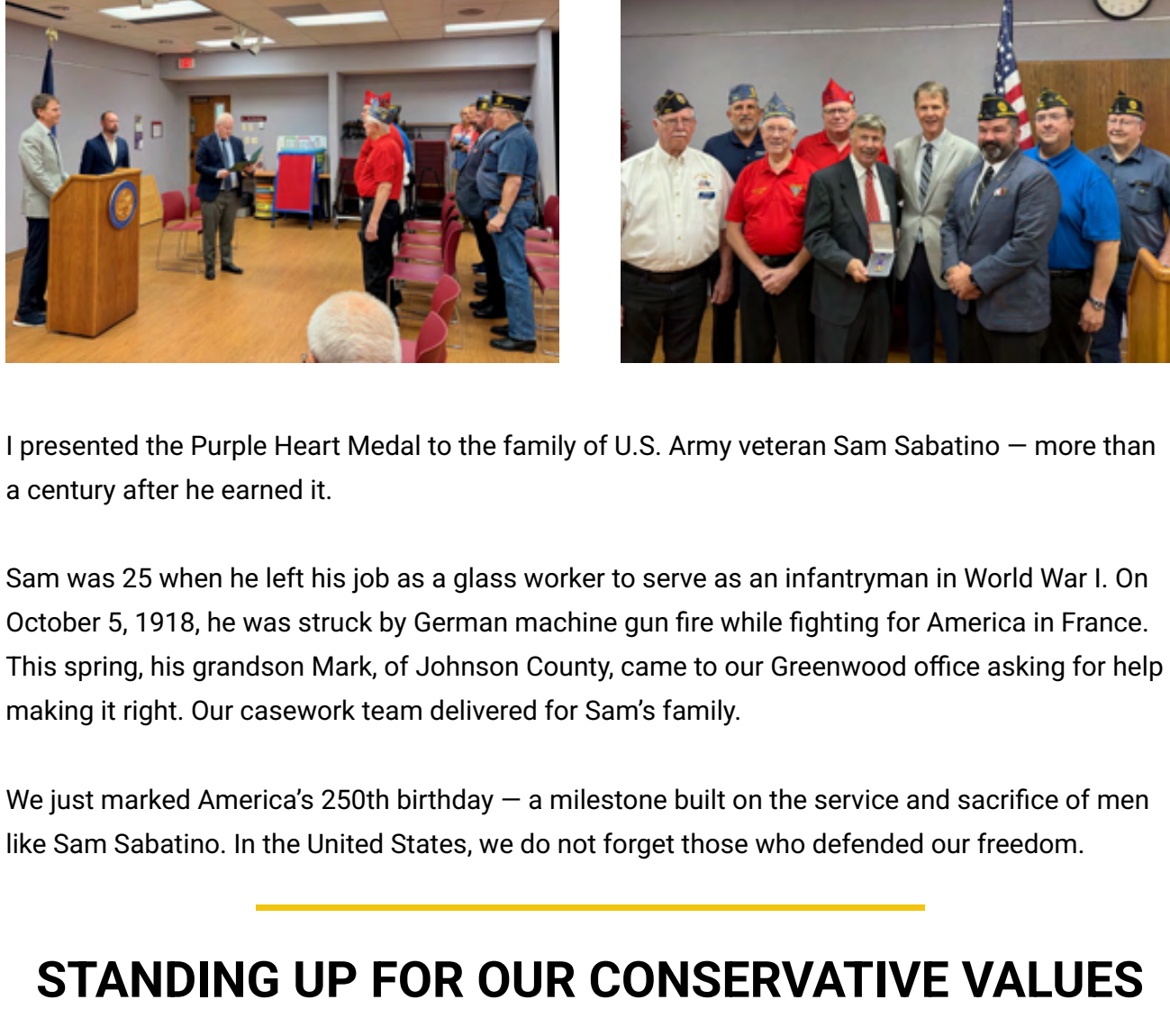
17 projects. \$45 million for Indiana's Sixth District.

Every Community Project Funding request I submitted for Hoosiers advanced through this year's Appropriations process. These requests came directly from conversations with community leaders and constituents about the needs facing our communities.

The first step is done. Now I'll keep working to get these projects through the full House and Senate before they become law and are funded.

A PURPLE HEART FINALLY COMES HOME



I presented the Purple Heart Medal to the family of U.S. Army veteran Sam Sabatino – more than a century after he earned it.

Sam was 25 when he left his job as a glass worker to serve as an infantryman in World War I. On October 5, 1918, he was struck by German machine gun fire while fighting for America in France. This spring, his grandson Mark, of Johnson County, came to our Greenwood office asking for help making it right. Our casework team delivered for Sam's family.

We just marked America's 250th birthday – a milestone built on the service and sacrifice of men like Sam Sabatino. In the United States, we do not forget those who defended our freedom.

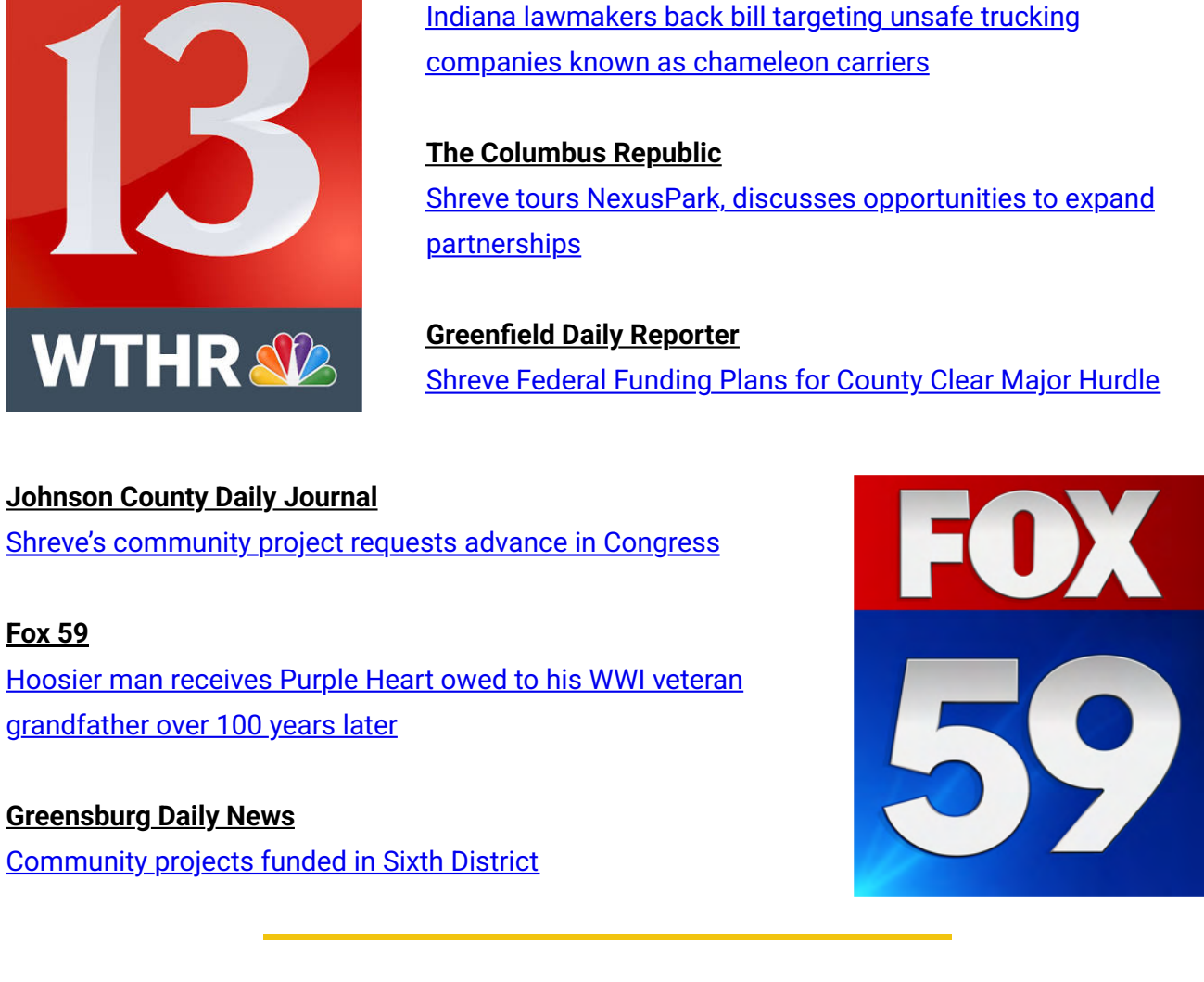
STANDING UP FOR OUR CONSERVATIVE VALUES

CONGRESSIONAL ART COMPETITION WINNER

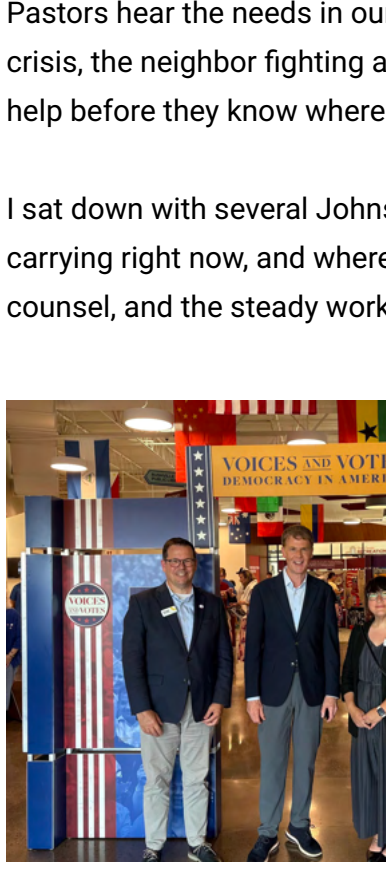


The first piece Annika Pentecost ever entered into an art competition now hangs in the U.S. Capitol.

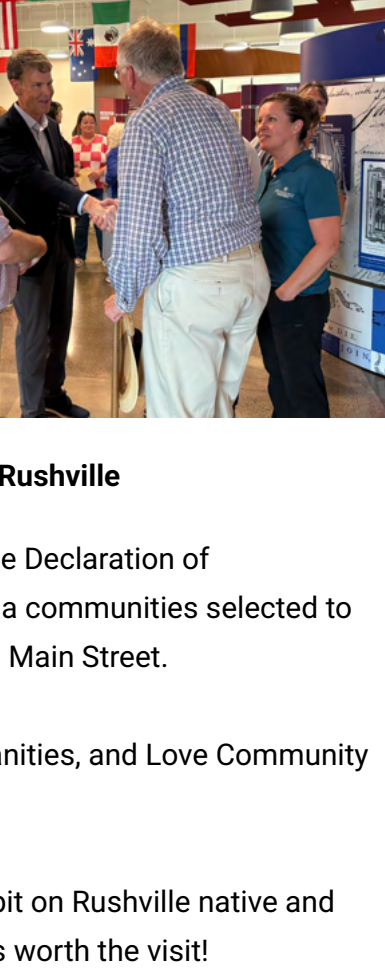

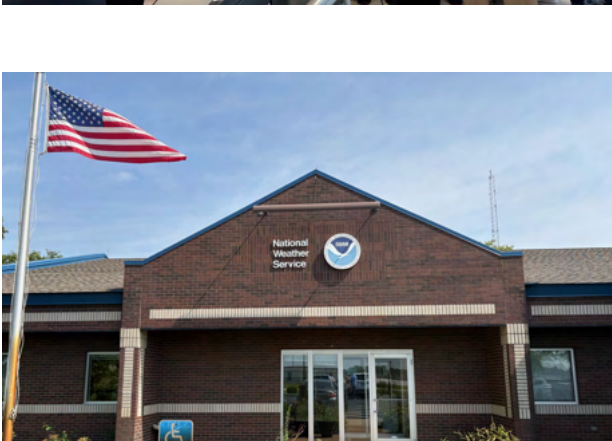
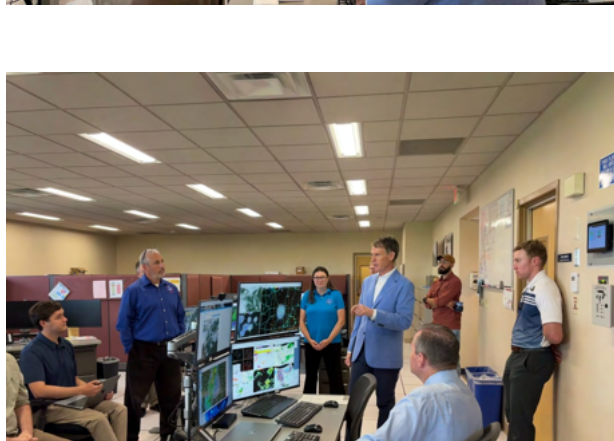

My wife and I met Hailey Buzbee's parents at Old Settlers Day in Wanamaker. Hailey was lured away by a predator she met online. By the time her case met the requirements for an AMBER Alert, it was too late.

I proudly cosponsored the HAILEY Act to honor Hailey's memory – and close that dangerous gap. This will allow law enforcement to alert the public sooner when a child is in danger. Hailey's story can help protect the next child – before it's too late.

National Weather Service Indianapolis

Before a storm reaches our communities, a team in Indy is already tracking it.

After the rough weather we've seen across Indiana this spring and summer, I scheduled by the National Weather Service to meet the meteorologists who monitor our skies and issue the warnings that keep Hoosiers safe.
